

Local Psychiatrist on target with 'Sam' prediction

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tracked Son of Sam's route of attacks. "I recognized that if you take any three points (on his route) you could complete a triangle," Clarke explained. Extending his triangle hypothesis, Clarke concluded that the killer's next strike would be in the Van Cortlandt Park area.

He said he refused to make his name public before Berkowitz' arrest because that would have diverted attention from the police investigation to himself. "Everybody would have called me and asked me for information," said Clarke. "Now, though, there's nothing to worry about."

The 28-year-old psychiatrist, who also serves as an acting director of the Lincoln Community Mental Health Center in the Bronx, admitted in his office there Wednesday that such a diagram "is not a standard technique in forensic (legal) psychiatry. This was just my way of trying to figure it out."

Clark has had a year of forensic training under Dr. Daniel Schwartz, the psychiatrist who is now examining Berkowitz in Kings County Hospital.

Clarke said he made his prediction after considering such psychological traits as the killer's obsessional qualities, which would lead him to act in repeated patterns, and the fact that he varied those patterns just enough to throw police off his trail.

The psychiatrist was interviewed by Yonkers and New York police after his radio broadcast. He said that he also subsequently called police to give some possible dates when the killer might strike next.

These dates, said Clarke, were deduced partly from the fact that Son of Sam always attacked on Saturdays, Sunday, Tuesdays or Thursdays. Among the dates that Clarke suggested was Aug. 11 — the day after Berkowitz was nabbed while heading toward his car outside his Yonkers apartment.

"The New York City police said the Homicide Task Force would get in touch with me, but they didn't," Clarke said Wednesday.

"I don't think police utilized the information seriously enough. Other people had given pertinent information. If they used my triangles with that information, they could have moved in," he said.

But according to Dr. Edward Allan, the chief of forensic psychiatry for Westchester County, Clarke's triangle "prediction" may be no more than "a good guess."

"I don't think it is scientific or relevant," he said. "The preponderance of schizophrenic patients have ritualistic behavior. That's what's striking about them. Clarke could have also picked some other idiosyncrasy in this case (to make his prediction.)"

Clarke also made some statements about Son of Sam that have not proven true of the man who is the suspected killer. Clarke said, for example that Son of Sam was probably a Manhattan resident. Berkowitz lived in Yonkers. He also hypothesized that the killer was a present or former member of a police force. Berkowitz, while an auxiliary police officer briefly, was never a member of police department.

He wanted to be a policeman

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The fact that Zigo was in the spotlight wasn't something new. He's been there before.

Through the years, Zigo has earned a reputation of being a tough policeman and he seems to carry that distinction as proudly as he wears his badge.

That reputation, and his neatly groomed mustache, have been his trademarks ever since he was a rookie living in the East New York section of Brooklyn in the 1960s.

Zigo and his partner, John Longo, assigned to the 10th Homicide Division in Brooklyn, followed the trail of a routine traffic summons to the Yonkers apartment house of David Berkowitz. There they found the suspect's cream-colored car parked outside.

"I looked into the car and saw a duffle bag with about two inches of rifle stock sticking out," Zigo told The Journal-News.

"The door was unlocked, and inside I found a .45-caliber machine gun. On the front seat there was a note with handwriting resembling the previous notes sent by the Son of Sam."

The arrest of Berkowitz followed and, to those who remember Zigo in his rookie days and have followed his career through newspaper clippings, it came as no surprise that he played a leading role in one of the most famous arrests in the city's history.

"He's the original Charles Bronson," said Herb Turner who lived near Zigo in Brooklyn. Turner, who now lives with his family on Long Island, said Zigo, despite his tough reputation, showed concern and compassion for people.

That concern was displayed when a neighborhood boy was injured in a stabbing incident.

"When Ed learned about the stabbing of my brother, he visited him to see how he was feeling and also to learn as much about the incident as possible," recalled Robert Halberstadt.

"I will always have respect for him for trying to help us," he said.

Another side of Zigo was

recalled by Pat Colantuono who lived next door to the policeman. One of Colantuono's big joys was to take the family car for a spin around the neighborhood... without a driver's license.

"I remember one instance when Ed caught me good and told my father," Colantuono said. "He later apologized to me for telling but he said he wanted to make sure I didn't do it again."

"Looking back, I respect him for what he did. It certainly left an impression on me."

"He has always been a forceful man who earns respect," Colantuono said.

And who can forget the sight of 11 teenagers running down Shepherd Avenue after they broke the windshield of Zigo's car during a stickball game?

The youngsters eventually mustered up enough courage to return to the scene of the crime to confess their evil deed. But take it from me, it wasn't easy.

The result was a stern lecture and the payment for damages.

Now 50 years old, with the rank of detective, second grade, Zigo can look back on a career that has earned him more than 24 commendations, including awards for meritorious service and excellent police work.

He also speaks proudly of being one of the original members of the city's famed hostage negotiating team.

The death of Zigo's wife about five months ago, prevented him from working full time during the early stages of the Son of Sam case. However, after the killing of Stacy Moskowitz, July 31, he was assigned to the investigation on a permanent basis.

Zigo, who lives on Long Island and is the father of two children, Edward, 25, and Susan, 20, said he has always enjoyed police work.

"Recently, my partner and I solved a triple homicide and I thought that it was the highlight of my career."

"Then came the Berkowitz arrest. There are always new challenges," he said, bluntly adding his future doesn't include plans for retirement.

FBI choice approval seen likely

Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., the senior member of the GOP conservative bloc on the panel, said he expects Johnson will win confirmation, barring unforeseen developments.

"I don't know of any special reason why he should be opposed," Thurmond said of the 58-year-old judge noted for decisions upholding the rights of blacks in civil rights cases.

Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., a leading liberal on the panel, applauded the nomination. "His career on the federal bench has been marked by an unflagging commitment to the concept of equal justice under law and a steadfast determination to guarantee the civil liberties and rights of all Americans," Kennedy said in a statement.

Johnson can expect close questioning from the judiciary committee.

Sen. James B. Allen, D-Ala., a committee member, said he is undecided about the nomination. But Allen said he wants to know what motivated Carter to select Johnson, whose decisions in certain cases have interjected him deeply into local and state affairs in Alabama.

"I want to ascertain the basis on which the appointment was made. Was it expertise in law enforcement or because of his rulings with respect to Alabama schools, prisons and mental health?" Allen said.

Committee members also are expected to question Johnson about his stand on intelligence gathering techniques of the FBI and his willingness to resist any political pressures on the agency.

One former FBI official is facing trial and others are under investigation for allegedly illegal use of wiretaps, mail openings and similar practices in the late 1960s and early 1970s.

The selection of Johnson to direct the FBI was announced at the White House Wednesday afternoon by Atty. Gen. Griffin B. Bell. It ended a seven-month search for a successor to Clarence M. Kelley, who is retiring Jan. 1.

Johnson, speaking at a news conference in Montgomery, Ala., said he hoped he could provide "positive, inspirational leadership and management know-how" to aid in the fight against crime.

"I hope I can be as fine a leader as J. Edgar Hoover," the man who had charge of the FBI for 47 years, Johnson said.

Carter, continuing his vacation at Camp David, Md., issued a statement praising Johnson as "a tough, fair-minded protector of justice and the law." He said that "my admiration for him is shared by those who have disagreed as well as agreed with his many difficult decisions from the bench."
