Claim in .44 Killer Case Approved

The New York State Crime Victims Compensation Board yesterday approved the first of six claims for financial aid filed by the victims and survivors of "Son of Sam," the .44-caliber-revolver killer.

Edward Morrison, chairman of the board, said the victims and survivors were seeking compensation for out-of-pocket medical and funeral expenses and unreimbursed loss of earnings. He said one award had been approved and two are pending before the board.

The first claim to be approved was filed by Nandor Freund, of 58-18 Linden Street, Ridgewood, Queens. His 26-year-old daughter, Christine, was shot to death last Jan. 30 as she sat in a parked car near the Long Island Rail Road station in Forest Hills, Queens. With her at the time, and unhurt, was John Diel, 30.

Mr. Freund was awarded \$1,500 for funeral expenses for his daughter, and, beginning next month, monthly payments of \$216.67 to cover lost earnings. These monthly payments, Mr. Morrison said, will continue until they total \$20,000, the maximum allowable under the state's compensation program.

Mr. Morrison said the board also approved an initial award of \$305 for med-

ical expenses for Joanne Lomino, 18 years old, of 83-31 262d Street, Bellerose, Queens. She was shot in the back of the head at about 12.40 A.M. on Nov. 27, 1976, while sitting on the porch of her home with a friend. Miss Lomino now is paralyzed from the waist down. Medical payments for her, totaling \$8,000, are pending before the board.

Applications for compensation also have been received by the board from the following:

¶Michael Lauria, whose 18-year-old daughter, Donna—the killer's first victim—was shot in the back and killed about 1 A.M. on July 29, 1976, while sitting in a parked car outside her home in the Westchester Heights section of the Bronx.

¶Ingrid Essau, whose 20-year-old son, Alexander, was shot to death at 3 A.M. last April 17 in the Baychester section of the Bronx.

¶Frank Suriani, whose 18-year-old daughter, Valentina, was killed while sitting in a parked car with Alexander Essau.

¶The family of Virginia Voskerichian, 19, who was shot last March 8 as she walked near her home in Forest Hills, Queens.
