by the continuing Gannett Westchester Newspapers investigation has found reason to doubt Berkowitz's confession.

Handwriting experts maintain Berkowitz was not the author of the Son of Sam June 1977 letter to columnist Jimmy Breslin. One expert, Charles Hamilton, says Berkowitz was "incapable of it."

Berkowitz, who confessed to all the Son of Sam attacks, also confessed to lighting 2,000 fires which police now say he could not have set. He also confessed to a knifing and shooting which police have no record of.

A yellow Volkswagen was seen at the Moskowitz killing, Berkowitz witnesses say. He drove a yellow Volkswagen for two months while living in Westchester. But a Ford Galaxie - which he was seen driving just before the Moskowitz murder - was the only car registered to him during that period.

"Dog-hater" Berkowitz strongly denied killing three German shepherd dogs found lying together near his Yonkers apartment in December 1976, but said in an interview that he had "a good idea who did it." On two occasions well after Berkowitz's arrest, three more German shepherds were found slain in the same spot. Gannett has recently been told of still more dog killings in the area.

An animal adoption agency in the Bronx received two phone calls two days before Berkowitz's arrest inquiring about a German shepherd dog advertised for adoption. Both callers mentioned Pine Street in Yonkers - Berkowitz's address. One of the callers said he was "David Berkowitz of Pine Street," while the other said he fixed cars (or "Carrs") behind Pine Street. Sam Carr, the so-called "Sam" in Son of Sam, lives behind Pine Street in Yonkers.

The day after the phone calls, two men appeared together at a Mamaroneck animal shelter to see an advertised German shepherd. One of them was identified as Berkowitz and the other was said to bear a strong resemblance to the long-haired police sketch of Son of Sam. Police, however, maintained Berkowitz didn't visit the kennel, but have not answered who, if not him, would have used his name to inquire about a German shepherd.

Of the witnesses to the eight Son of Sam attacks, only one source says was going to be able to identify Berkowitz as the assailant.

Psychiatrist David Abrahamson, who examined Berkowitz for the Brooklyn District Attorney, wrote recently that he believed Berkowitz was lying in his confession when he attributed his acts to "demons." And since his confession Berkowitz has denied the existence of the demons.
